Topical Panel on Diversity, Equality, and Inclusion (DEI): Challenges and Strategies for Teaching in an Anti-DEI Climate

As legislatures in two states have become the frontrunners in adopting laws to all but eliminate DEI efforts at their institutions of higher learning, it is still unknown how these efforts will trigger the passage of similar laws in other states. In some instances, institutions are requiring educational staff to go through syllabi to remove any references to DEI. But what does this mean for JMC programs, particularly those that have achieved full ACEJMC accreditation? At the ACEJMC meeting in August 2021, the Council unanimously approved a Resolution on Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Social Justice. In 1985, ACEJMC became one of the first national accreditors to include a diversity standard in its program reviews. Recent revisions to the standard and adoption of this resolution strengthen the Council's commitment to DEI accreditation expectations. This panel will discuss what JMC programs can do to ensure DEI remains a priority in curriculum in today's anti-DEI climate.
